Tackling negative street culture and its connection to drug dealing, young people and vulnerable adults at risk of exploitation;		
1	Continue the Streetwise project in the city centre to tackle begging, drug abuse, street drinking and environmental crime.	Police, City Council, Turning Point, homeless services working together to support and address behaviour of most chaotic clients. Top 10 client share process, daily patrols by City Centre Ambassadors, street engagement by dedicated City Council and police resources.
Reducing serious violence and to undertake a review into policing Oxford's late night entertainment;		
2	Review the partnership response to policing the night time economy.	Project brief developed. Partner data collection and analysis underway. Review of police resourcing taken forward. To continue in 2019-20.
3	Develop a local hate crime action plan to support victims of hate crime.	Partnership hate crime plan developed. Activities include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hate crime awareness week working with the police to promote reporting through their "Hidden harm" campaign. • Police have an Independent Advisory Group of representing a wide range of communities. • Police Community and Diversity Officer works with communities, particularly in response to issues that raise community concerns or tensions. • Hate crime page on City Council's website • Promotion of the Victim First service • Analysis of repeat victims and perpetrators of hate crimes reported to the police – repeats are problem-solved. • All hate crime offences are reviewed by a specialist police officer.
Supporting the Government's Violence Against Women and Girls Strategy by tackling domestic abuse and other interpersonal crimes;		
4	Provide a local response to a County wide Modern Slavery Action Plan, currently being developed.	MS Delivery Plan developed and presented to OSCP. Elmore research project continues, due to report in October. Data sharing hurdles have cause delays. Work on-going on cuckooing and

		training by the Willow Project. Human Exploitation Coordinator managing the plan on behalf of the Oxfordshire Community Safety Partnership.
5	Continue the successful work of the Sex Workers Intervention Panel that supports vulnerable individuals who have chaotic lifestyles to reduce the harm to themselves and the wider community.	On 12 th March 2019 the Sex Worker Harm Reduction packs were piloted including health products and support service information. They are being trialled for 6 months at front facing service providers. The Outreach Project is due to be launched in early May. A promotional campaign is being developed to get together a group of volunteers. A location is being considered as a base for individuals to get a hot drink, something to eat and advice.
6	Develop and build on the successful rollout of the national 'Ugly Mug' scheme that protects sex workers from being victims of crime.	National Ugly Mug information is included within in the Sex Worker Harm Reduction Packs, which is currently being launched as pilot by Outreach services. Services are promoting and trying to identify a safe location to promote the scheme as well as highlight any new reports.
7	Build on Oxford City Hotel Watch that protects vulnerable individuals from exploitation and promotes safeguarding within the hospitality industry.	The Oxford City Hotel Watch Working Group meets on bi-annual basis. It is currently looking into under 18 year's old bookings policies or lack of continuity across the city. There is a need for more representatives from the sector. Currently the group is led by officers and we want to encourage them to have more ownerships of the scheme.
8	Work with partners across Oxfordshire to protect victims of domestic abuse.	The Oxfordshire Domestic Abuse Strategy Board, which OSCP is a member of have developed a Young People's Pathway, Domestic Abuse Training for professionals, drafting of a DA strategy, delivery plan and dashboard. Work with TVP on the updated MARAC Protocol. Supporting the Thames Valley BAMER Project to provide improved services for victims from BAMER communities. Supported the Victim's First Coercive Control Campaign. Delivered training to Oxford City Council staff on domestic abuse, stalking & harassment and Honour Based Violence. Supported the role out of MATAC in Oxford. Assisted in the organisation and delivery of a Thames Valley workshop on Domestic Homicide Reviews.

9	Continue to work with our Oxfordshire local authorities to address safeguarding responses under the Joint Operating Framework for Taxis and Transporting Vulnerable Adults.	Work on closer alignment with neighbouring policies completed. Enforcement work has increased in the evenings resulting in a 3 rd of all complaints relating to taxis from neighbouring districts. All drivers are safeguarding trained. Working with operators to assist in bringing drivers and vehicles back under the Oxford licensing authority.
Tackling Organised Crime Groups;		
10	Tackle organised crime groups by supporting Thames Valley Police's Stronghold campaign.	Work against OCG's primarily led by the MADE partnership group. Most OCG's in Oxford are involved in the drug trade. 4Ps approach has resulted in good partnership work on protecting young people, vulnerable adults and disrupting the groups.
11	Promote, advise and support all activities incorporated within Thames Valley Police Cyber Crime Strategy	Part of the work has included a work placement looking into cybercrime. A research report is in its final stages that focuses on school children and their understanding of cybercrimes. All cybercrime communications sourced from the TVP lead are sent out via social media.
Tackling the open drug markets that impact on our communities feelings of safety		
12	Identify hot spot areas that are affected by the open drug markets and lead and support communities to take back their streets.	TVP and Oxford City Council are working in partnership as the city's drug task force. Priority areas have included Meadow Lane, South Parks, Friars Wharf and areas in East Oxford. Multi-Agency Drug Exploitation meets fortnightly. Community call-backs develop intelligence and provide reassurance (259 so far). Uses CLEAR, HOLD, BUILD approach. Briefing for partners includes Uni, Brookes, Car Parks etc.
13	Work in partnership to keep our communities safe from the harm caused by drug lines operating from other major cities, including addressing child drug exploitation.	Work against CDL's primarily led by the MADE partnership group. CDL activity has fluctuated during the year in response to making Oxford a more hostile environment to deal drugs in open spaces and cuckooed properties. A number of arrests has assisted in the disruption in these activities.
14	Protect vulnerable adults who are at risk of being "cuckooed" into hosting drug dealing	Partners use closure orders to protect vulnerable adults, relying on close cooperation between housing providers and the police. Other partners are receiving training for front line staff on what to look for

		when on visits.

15	Develop and strengthen peer monitoring and our restorative approaches.	An independent review of the City Council's ASB Service's capability to undertake mediation and restorative justice has just been completed. A number of recommendations have been developed.
